# Tettemer, Murray Named As U8 Select Coaches

The Coaching Oversight Committee is pleased to announce the Lead Head Coaches for spring's U8 Select teams. For the boys, Sean Tettemer will lead the program. Sean is a former college player and longtime coach. He currently is the Boys' Varsity Head Coach at Broadneck High School and has coached his boys in the Severna Park Clinic and Club Programs. On the girls side, Kate Murray

will lead the program. Kate is a former GSPAA player and played at Severna Park High School and James Madison University. She, too, is a long-time coach in the Severna Park Clinic and Club Programs, and also has served as a ter. These teams will compete in League Coordinator.

Boys' U8 tryouts are set for November 5 – 7 at Kinder Farm Park, while the girls U8 tryouts will be a week later. November 12-14 at a location to be determined shortly.

As many teams will be formed as there are qualified and interested players. # **TEAM UPDATES**

#### Lasers Unbeaten, Surrender No Goals in Sixteen Games

The Lasers (U11G) have an impressive combined Fall 2011 record of 15 wins, 0 losses and 1 tie. In compiling this record the Lasers have scored 64 goals while allowing none thus far in their tournament and WAGS (Washington Area Girls Soccer League) regular season games.

On October 8-10, the Lasers participated in the WAGS Columbus Day tournament in Centreville, Virginia. The Lasers put on a dominant tournament performance, scoring 13 goals, while giving up none over the course of five games. The Lasers defeated teams from Loudon, Sterling and Arlington in the preliminary rounds by a combined score of 9-0, advancing to the semifinals, where they defeated Gunston Premier 3-0. The finals pitted the Lasers against Lower Merion Soccer Club, the reigning Division 1 champions of the Philadelphia Area Girls Soccer League. After a 0-0 first half score, the Lasers scored early in the second half and held on for a hardfought 1-0 championship victory.

The Lasers have claimed the championships of their past four tournaments, including: the WAGS tournament; Gettysburg Battlefield Blast (August 2011); Freestate Capitol Cup (March 2011) and Mountain Road Thanksgiving Tournament (November 2010). The Lasers will next appear at the Bethesda Thanksgiving Tournament.

# Training Tips from Dave Vincent: The Importance Of A Dynamic Warm Up For Soccer Players

The importance of a proper dynamic warm up will prolong your soccer career, reduce the risk of injury and minimize soreness after training and games. Not to mention it will also improve your flexibility as well as on field performance. It prepares your muscles for competition and ensures you are ready to compete at the highest level.

You can use this dynamic warm up before your workouts, training sessions, and games. Remember to move slowly through each movement and really attempt to push the range of your flexibility. A dynamic warm up prepares the body for the demands of a work out, practice or game, increases heart rate, respiratory rate and blood flow to the muscles, in-

creases core body temperature, and enhances muscle elasticity.

The warm up should be 10 to 20 minutes and may vary depending on the athletes age, current physical condition and prior exercise experience. A soccer player should:

- •Warm up with exercises for both the upper and lower extremities
- •Progress from low to a higher intensity

The following includes several different exercises that can be utilized during the dynamic warm up. Remember to progress accordingly

Slow jog

Walk on toes•30' x 2•Works on ankle motion, strengthening and working on balance

Arm swing (working on shoulder range of motion)

- Work on running form
- •Start at slow speed and increase
- •Slowly increase the range of motion

Straight leg kicks (maintain alignment of stance leg)

- •Stand tall, kick leg up in front
- knee hugs
- •"Open and close the gait"-Hip motion.
- •Reach for the toes (avoid slouching forward when reaching for the toes

## Severna Park Soccer Hosts AAYSA Classic Games

Severna Park Soccer hosted eight games of the AAYSA Classic tournament at its fields at Kinder Park during October. The Classic is a double elimination tournament for teams participating in the Anne Arundel County Youth Soccer League or recreational leagues withinthe County. The tournament takes place over the course of three weeks.
